Narajole Raj College is located in a rural area of Paschim Medinipur district and providing higher education to the financially weaker students. The College has 17 Departments to offer 15 programmes at the degree level and 2 at PG level.

An effective curriculum delivery has been ensured through a well-planned and documented process. Academic calendar is prepared and implemented by the college. The College has adopted practice of conducting meeting with all faculty members and Heads of the Departments in the beginning of each academic session to prepare a comprehensive plan for implementation of the curriculum.

Semester system is introduced by the college in the year 2017-18 as it was introduced by the affiliating university from the year 2017-18. Five value added courses such as craft making, communication skills etc have been introduced by the College.

The laboratories of the various departments are adequately equipped for implementation of curriculum.


Effective delivery of the curriculum is also ensures by adopting teaching practices and offers opportunities to the students to express their views and improve their skills. Moreover, student oriented methods like group discussion, experiential learning, seminars, assignments, tutorials and other aids to promote general communication skills among students are explored by the College.


Study tours are regular activities of teaching learning process.

All teachers ensure creating awareness among the students about moral values, ethics and about various environmental/ cultural issues while imparting subject specific skills.

To sensitise students with the cross cutting issues relevant to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics, special courses viz. Foundation Course in Human Rights Education, Environmental Studies have been incorporated in the curriculum.

However, college has adopted few innovative methods but needs further enhancement. Moreover, since most of the teaching and non-teaching positions are vacant, it has been reflected adversely on delivery and implementation of the curriculum.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion II (300 to 500 words)

College enrolled students through online system introduced by the affiliating university and admissions are strictly on merit basis. College assesses the learning levels of the students after conducting internal assessment (Continuous Internal Assessment) and identifies slow learners, advanced learners. College organizes special programs for slow learners and provides some incentives for advanced learners. However, structured mechanism needs to be developed for identification of slow and advanced learners after admission.

The college adopted interactive methods and experiential learning of teaching through various activities like group discussions, field survey, project work, field work, quiz, seminars etc.

Some of the class rooms are equipped with ICT facilities. Moreover, INFLIBNET and Wifi facilities are also available in the college. The college also has a cine club. Film & video shows on educational interest are organized.

The college promotes creativity amongst students by encouraging them to publish articles, poems, stories in the college magazine, wall magazine etc.

The College follows the evaluation system of affiliating university. Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) (10 %) is an integral part of evaluation system. Adequate transparency in the evaluation is maintained and students' grievances are resolved at college level. Academic calendar is prepared by the college in the beginning of each academic year and all academic activities are implemented accordingly.

Program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes for all offered programs may be stated, displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students. Moreover, its attainment methodology may be developed.

An eco-system for nurturing innovative ideas of students and faculty members may be developed by the college.

College adopted the village 'BORAMARA' in the year 2011 as a part of Extension Programme. Various activities such as health awareness, prevention of violence against women, training in music, recitation, art and craft for children, computer training for youth, use of mobile technology, awareness for organic fertilizer (Vermi composite), reducing use of chemical fertilizers, promoting healthy social attitudes and fighting superstitions etc have been organized by the college.

College has also organized extension activities such as art and craft training for elderly people in collaboration with Fevi-Crill, Pedilite India Ltd., Kolkata. Similarly, programmes on bio-fertilizers in collaboration with IIT, Kharagpur.

Various other programs such as Eye-Test Camp in collaboration with Sarbik Gramin Vikash Kendra, Daspur, training on disaster management in collaboration with Professional Institute for Development and Socio-Environmental Management, Gobardanga North 24 Parganas have been organized by the College.

College has vibrant NSS and NCC units. Three NCC cadets have attended Talsainik National Camp in the year 2015-16 and also RD Parade at New Delhi in the year 2014-15 and 2015-16.

The College has adequate infrastructure to facilitate teaching learning process. The College has 1.2 acres of land where the built up area is 2100 sq meters. There are 17 classrooms (out of which 07 class rooms are ICT equipped), 01 seminar hall, 08 laboratories, library, administrative block, conference hall, boys' hostel having occupancy of only 15 students.

College may establish facilities such as boys and girls hostel, playgrounds for kho-kho, volley ball, football etc for the promotion of sports activities.

The college has ICT equipped seminar hall for conducting conferences, seminars, workshops, presentations. The college has well equipped sufficiently large hall for cultural programs.

The College has 94 computers out which 54 are available for the students and remaining are being used for administration and by the academic departments.

The College has an adequately equipped library with 27338 number of text books, reference books and 20 Journals and magazines. Separate reading room is available for teachers and students.

College has recently initiated automation of library. LMS' software is recently purchased and teachers are using e-books, e-journals and database form N-List, National Digital Library.

College has adequate IT facilities, however separate budget provision may be made for upgrading of IT facilities.

Similarly, budget allocation for augmentation and maintenance of physical and technical infrastructure may be made by the college.



The college has students' council whose members are elected by the college students only. Elections are conducted as per the specified guidelines by affiliating University. Members of the students council have adequate representation in various committees constituted by the college such as Governing Body, Sports and Cultural Committee, Anti Ragging and Discipline Cell, Grievances Redressal Cell etc

The Alumni Association of the college is established and registered in the year 2015. Presently, 213 members are in this association. Alumni association has constructed the flag hoisting stand and a martyr's stone at the front of college building. Alumni association also provided financial assistance to build the ramp for differently able students and for the beautification of college garden.

Alumni association has provided financial assistance of Rs. 1,23,500/- during last five years.

College provides tuition fees of 50 % waiver for 10 % of the students.

The College has clearly stated its vision and mission statements. The college activities are in tune with its vision and mission statements.

Governing Body is the apex body of the college and responsible for taking important decisions regarding administrative affairs and policy matters. However, the day-to-day management of the college is vested with the Teacher-in-charge, Teachers' council and IQAC of the college.

College has constituted various committees having adequate representation of the staff members, such as IQAC, planning & development committee, academic committee, examination committee etc.

Decentralization and participative management may be further strengthened by the College.

The College has prepared a plan to improve the overall competency of the students. However, strategic plan and deployment documents may be prepared and implemented by the College.

College may take efforts to make effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees visible through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions.

College has a provision for GSLI / SSLI for the permanent staff. College provides financial assistance to the staff members and / OR their family members in case of any casualty.

College has self- appraisal system for all teaching and non-teaching staff.

College regularly conducts financial audit by the government approved chartered accountants and audit objections are resolved in time.

The College has made sincere efforts to mobilize the resources from the Government, UGC and Alumni. However, it may be strengthened further.



IQAC is established in the College in the year 2014. IQAC has played proactive role to ensure quality in teaching –learning and administration of the College. However, its functioning may be improved further.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion VII (300 to 500 words)

The College has functional women cell and regularly conducting programs for gender equality. College has ensured the safety and security of the students and established facilities for students counselling and separate common room for girls.

The College has established system for waste management (Solid waste management, Liquid waste management, E-waste management). However, needs to be further strengthened.

The College has rain water harvesting system and utilizing the harvested water for various purposes in the college premises.

The College has established Green club in the year 2015 and practiced many Green-culture activities in the college premises. Several awareness programmes such as Vana – Mahotsav, world environmental day, restricting the use of plastics inside the campus, restricting the entry of cars and motor bikes inside the campus, awareness programmes to encourage more use of by-cycles and public transports are organized by the College.

The College organises several programmes on National festivals and observed the Birth and Death anniversaries of the great Indian personalities such as Swami Vivekananda, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Rabindranath Tagore, Michael Madhusudan Dutta, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar etc

The College has initiated efforts to maintain transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions. However, a structured mechanism may be developed to maintain the complete transparency.

The College has two best practices namely i) promotion of innovative ideas into commercially viable products ii) Extension programme at adopted village Baramara

The faculty members of the College are taking well directed efforts for encouraging students to think differently and they had some evidences of success. However, structured mechanism may be developed for demand analysis of the region and making strategic plans to address the same. Similarly, for extension programme at adopted village Baramara, the College has evidences of success such as craft training program, program on using bio – fertilizers, social awareness drive, training on disaster management, legal assistance programme. However, college may initiate the programme which will have more visible outcomes.

The College has initiated PG Programmes in two subjects Bengali and Sanskrit. Moreover, Departments of Physics is promoting research culture in the Department. As this College is in the remote area of West Bengal, these activities are appreciable to consider as distinct feature of the institution. However, College may initiate efforts to identify local needs in context of increasing the employability of the students and initiate systematic efforts to achieve the same.
